ALN will work through six main areas over the next five years:

- Strengthening a supportive African network that draws together Landcare initiatives to learn from each and build the leadership of the network.
- **Providing capacity building** to Landcare champions, including youth through Junior Landcare.
- Developing and disseminating communications products including detailed Landcare success stories and case studies.
- Mobilising resources within the network and other partners to support country projects and programmes as well as networking activities, through small grants, national budgets and large programmes.
- Promoting partnerships and creating buy-in among government structures for policy inclusion. Integrating Landcare principles into Africawide and sub-regional programmes.
- Facilitating access to knowledge and transfer of skills and best practices through connections to research, cultural and formal education systems and extension services.

ALN has huge potential to support a growing network of Landcare champions, projects and programmes in Africa. By working through six main areas, the network hopes to bring about meaningful change in the lives and landscapes of the continent.
